Jovan McCoy, Class of 1993



He was a Member of O'Dea's first WIAA football championship ('91). A Team captain ('92). He earned: Outstanding off. back ('91, '92). Off. MVP football ('92). Team MVP ('92). He still is the School record holder for most TD's in a playoff game. He



was also a Member of 4x100 state relay champ ('93). He was a UW football scholarship recipient. He was part of the Co-PAC 12 champion ('95) and Huskies most improved defensive back ('96).

Ryan Williams, Class of 1994

A three year varsity letterman in basketball. Achieved all-metro honors and set the single game scoring record (46 points) in state tournament competition. Was awarded an Athletic Scholarship to the University of San Diego. While there he received all-conference honors. He graduated in 1998.



1991 O'Dea Football Team

The 1991 O'Dea Football Team finished with a 12-1 record and captured the first football state championship in O'Dea history. The team rebounded from its only loss, a 21-20 overtime loss in the Metro Championship game, with a memorable run to the title. A first round road win over #1 ranked Shelton followed by a 43-0 destruction of Seattle Prep sent the 1991 team to the semi-finals where they handled Hazen 41-10. The 91 Irish finished the season with a 21-14 victory



over Prosser in the title game. The 1991 Football Team is remembered as a very talented team without any superstars. They won because they played hard, and played together to help establish O'Dea Football as a state power.
