Joselito "Lito" Barber '98



Raised in Seattle, Lito attended St. Paul School and then in 1994 enrolled at O'Dea High School where he was a student leader, and active in Campus Ministry and social service projects. Lito was known for his fun nature and caring personality, evidenced by the way he looked after underclassman. Staff remember him as a wonderful student who was happy and got along with everyone. He graduated from the University of Washington in 2004 with a Bachelor's Degree in Science, Technology and Environment. He then graduated from the Basic Law Enforcement Academy and received his appointment in January of 2006. Lito was assigned to the Seattle East Precinct for the Seattle Police Department following his appointment. He died in the line of duty on August 13, 2006. Friends and family are working towards endowing a scholarship at O'Dea in Lito's name.

Nate Burleson '99



In 2012, during the twilight of his 11-year NFL career, Nate attended a Broadcast Boot Camp put on by the NFL. After retiring from his playing career in 2014, he put that education to work when he accepted a role as an analyst for the *NFL Network*. Thus began a new career for Nate as a TV personality. In 2016 he was the only former player named as one of four co-hosts to *Good Morning Football*, and in 2017 he joined *The NFL on CBS* as a studio analyst. In 2021 Nate was named co-anchor for *CBS Mornings* and began working with *Nickelodeon*, where he most recently co-hosted the 2023 *Kids' Choice Awards*. He has won two

Sports Emmy Awards for his outstanding work. Nate has had the opportunity to interview several stars including Jennifer Lopez and Rihanna, but as Nate says, "As much as I love sports and entertainment...I also want to be part of those stories that create a better world because... I don't think there's anything more fulfilling than that."

During his broadcasting career, Burleson has continually given on-air love and shout-outs to O'Dea High School and participated in various virtual O'Dea events sharing his time and talents with members of the student body, faculty, and staff. He maintains close relationships with his former O'Dea teachers, coaches, and classmates and has hosted many of them on site at his shows over the years. 
Dr. Jeanne Eulberg

Donald Murray attended high school at Brother Rice in Chicago where he led the marching and concert bands. There, he became convinced that his future would be as a member of the Brothers' Congregation that ministered the school. The year after his graduation, he professed his annual vows as Brother Dominic. In his first assignment at O'Dea, he taught Religion and Math, directed a small band, and started a class in choral music. He then moved on to other Christian Brother schools, before eventually returning to O'Dea where he served as Principal from 1993 to 2010 – the longest tenure of any Principal to this day. Brother Murray was known for his compassionate support of the faculty, staff, and students at O'Dea. He was always available for people in

times of need, whether academically or personally. He was a true minister of faith, helping people with humility and grace. He also brought joy to people through his love of music; singing Broadway show tunes and Irish ballads, or playing the electric keyboard he kept in his office. His love of academics, and particularly math, ensured that students were well-educated in the subject throughout his time at O'Dea. Brother Murray is truly an example of Christian commitment and servant leadership. His long involvement at O'Dea meaningfully enhanced the experience of many faculty, staff, and students.

Whether serving as Board Chair, volunteering as the Business Manager on a full-time basis, or financially supporting the school, Roy has been integral to moving O'Dea forward in countless ways. His inspiration to support O'Dea comes from his strong belief in our mission; a belief that is rooted in his own education at an Edmund Rice Christian Brother school in Montana. His profound interest in technology which he believes is vitally important to a young person's education, led him to create O'Dea's first computer lab in the 1990's. Since that time, he has continued to guide and fund O'Dea's technology, ensuring our faculty and students have access to a wide variety of technological tools. Roy also has a deep regard for the historic 1923 building, the heart and soul of O'Dea. His care and

concern for it has ensured O'Dea has been able to conduct significant renovations to help O'Dea provide an enriching environment for our faculty and students.
