



Johri Fogerson '08

Johri Fogerson, Class of 2008, was an exceptional three-sport athlete at O'Dea High School, excelling in football, basketball, and track. He helped lead the basketball team to a State Championship appearance in 2006 and captured the state title in the high jump his senior year with an impressive 6'10" leap. On the football field, Johri was a three-year varsity starter, beginning as an outside linebacker and cornerback before transitioning to running back and free safety his senior year. That season, he played in the O'Dea State Championship game and set the rushing record at the Tacoma Dome title game with 30 carries for 297 yards.

His senior year accolades included Red Zone Player of the Year, State Player of the Year, Times Male Athlete of the Year, selection to the East-West All-State All-Star Team, and a #66 national ranking on ESPN's Top 150 list. Graduating with a 3.4 GPA, Johri earned a full-ride scholarship to the University of Washington, where he contributed as a defensive back, running back, wide receiver, and punt returner. He was a four-time PAC-10 Defensive Player of the Week as a freshman and graduated in 2012 before pursuing opportunities in the NFL and CFL. His professional career ended in 2015 after a season-ending injury with the Seattle Seahawks.



Casey Moriarty '01

Casey Moriarty, Class of 2001, was a standout distance runner at O'Dea High School, earning six varsity letters in Cross Country and Track and Field. He captured Metro League titles in the 1600m and 3200m, won the Sea-King District title in the 3200m, and finished as runner-up in the 3200m at the WIAA 3A State Championship. Casey was a key contributor to four consecutive Metro League Championship teams from 1998–2001.

At Yale University, Casey continued his success as a six-time letter winner in Cross Country and Track and Field, earned two First Team All-Ivy League honors in Cross Country, and served as captain of the Yale Track and Field team. He also won the 2003 IC4A Cross Country Championship. Later, while attending law school, Casey used his final year of eligibility at Seattle University, where he set school records in the 8000m and 10,000m, captured the GNAC Cross Country Championship, and earned All-American honors with a 15th-place finish at the NCAA Division II Cross Country Championship in 2005.

Coach Tim Greenan '80



Tim Greenan, Class of 1980, has dedicated more than three decades to shaping O'Dea football. After graduating from Gonzaga University in 1985, he began his coaching career at O'Dea in 1990 as one of the freshman football coaches and a varsity assistant. In 1995, Tim became a faculty member at O'Dea and was appointed to the varsity staff by Coach Kohler. He coached the offensive line and linebackers, contributing to O'Dea's legendary "Scoreless in Seattle" State Championship victory that same year.

Since 2016, he has focused on coaching the offensive line and developing the unit that is central to O'Dea football. Over the years, Tim has played an integral role in five State Championships: 1991, 1994, 1995, 2017, and 2024.

A proud alumnus and lifelong mentor, Coach Greenan remains deeply committed to the mission of O'Dea High School, guiding student-athletes to excel both on and off the field.



Patrick Lavin '99

Pat Lavin, Class of 1999, was a standout on the football field and an accomplished student-athlete at O'Dea High School. A three-year varsity letterman, he was named First Team All-Metro League and co-Metro Lineman of the Year, and played in the East-West All-Star Game. Pat was also selected to the Seattle Times Star Times team, earned Associated Press All-State recognition, voted O'Dea's Most Valuable Player, and received Honorable Mention All-American honors. Off the field, he was student body president, valedictorian, and recipient of the Archbishop Murphy Award.

At Harvard University, Pat continued his success, earning three varsity letters and playing a key role on the Crimson's undefeated 2001 team. As a senior, he started all 10 games at defensive end for a 7-3 Harvard Team, including the first-ever Division I-AA game broadcast on ESPN Gameday. He graduated as part of the winningest class in more than 100 years of Harvard Football and earned Verizon Academic All-Ivy League honors.

Today, Pat combines his professional expertise and athletic background through programs like Coaching Boys into Men and Team Up Washington, and has shared his message with O'Dea, the Washington Huskies, and the Seattle Seahawks organization.

2009 State Championship Baseball Team



The 2009 O'Dea Baseball Team etched its name in school history with a thrilling run to the WIAA 3A State Championship. Finishing the season with a 19–7 record, the Fighting Irish delivered their crowning moment with a title-clinching victory at Safeco Field over Bainbridge Island, showcasing the poise and determination that defined their season.
